

Reflection... by Fr Michael Tate

A while ago, I heard on the news of the trial in Saudi Arabia of a woman who had been raped. The man was convicted and sentenced, but so was she! She was to suffer over 100 lashes of the whip for allowing herself to be in a situation in the company of a male not a near relative. Her conduct threatened the strict demarcation deemed necessary in that society.

The same strict rules applied in Jesus' time, with the added dimension that at times a woman could be "unclean". Her touch could contaminate a male and render him "unclean". The boundary had to be maintained. Jesus was the great boundarybreaker when it came to women.

Why is the Pharisee shocked at the scene of a woman anointing and kissing Jesus' feet as he lay at table? One element was the Pharisee's embarrassment because he had omitted the courtesy of having Jesus' feet washed before reclining at table. She remedied the insult.

But the main sense of shock was that Jesus allowed her to *touch* him. A taboo was being shattered. He was in grave peril from this deliberate contact. But instead of repudiating her, Jesus observes that it is simply the overflow of love of a forgiven woman, and he won't reject her gesture. The old rules which segregated and quarantined women for fear of what they might do to men are superseded by the presence of Jesus. This is a sign of the reign of God.

Has the Church got the message—the Gospel message? Does it live it out to the fullest extent possible?

St Luke reinforces this message in the next passage which portrays Jesus

"preaching and bringing the good news of the reign of God." And he did so with a band of travelling companions. They symbolized what the reign of God looks like as it shapes a human community. And who were they? Many women, three of them named, travelling with Jesus and twelve men, not their relatives. This would have been scandalous. This was boundary-breaking behavior. This was utterly counter cultural.

We have to recover the evident truth that Jesus enjoyed the company of women. Very confident in his own identity, he was completely relaxed, talking with them, allowing them to touch him. In other words, he would quite naturally engage in the most outrageous behaviour, subverting the codes which had demeaned, quarantined and even demonized women over the centuries. */Cont'd P4*

NEWS FROM KUYA -

"It is my great pleasure to communicate with you today giving you some news about us. You have always showed a constant interest. I hope these few lines will help in strengthening our relationship. Since May 2012, Kuya Center has welcomed 36 street children between 7 and 17 years old into our Center. Some of them have been reconciled with their family and some have been referred to long-term institutions to help them continue their studies.

At this time, 14 boys are living at the center. In the streets our staff meets regularly around 150 children, 97 boys and 52 girls, reaching out to them and providing instruction, education, care and, when possible some food and some medicines. We continue to cater for more than 20 children that are part of our community-based program. Some of those children are former kids that Kuya Center rescued in the past and are finishing their high school studies. Our partnership with Immigration Solutions Australia (ISA Group) has enabled two boys to continue in vocational training, while our partnership with the RNDM Sisters provides livelihood opportunities for many of the mothers of our former street children." There is another element. We know that Peter and others recruited on the shores of the Sea of Galilee had left their fishing cooperative to follow Him. Jesus was obviously not engaged in the carpentry trade. How were they to survive on the mission? How were they to get the necessities of life?

His band of followers included rather wellto-do women with funds and contacts which enabled the mission to continue. They were grateful to Jesus who had healed them of various maladies and their generosity in response was legendary. Without their financial aid, Jesus could not have conducted his mission in the way he wanted to.

The gospel record is clear and the church needs to take it to heart. Jesus accepted women to an outrageous degree,

overturning all the norms of society. Jesus depended on women to carry out his mission as an itinerant preacher of no fixed address. Jesus not merely preached the reign of God. He imaged it in his band of travelling companions, both female and male.

He was, He is, truly the Saviour of all human beings without distinction of gender. He is the Saviour for all humanity. He is the Saviour of the world.
