SCHOOL PRINCIPALS:

t the end of The Laws of Our Fathers, Scott Turow has one of his characters, Seth Weissman, preach at a memorial service. The text for that service is today's first reading and his words capture the challenge before us.

'I always return to the story of Abraham and Isaac ...the founder of the Western faiths ...He was a visionary, a prophet ...But despite this, Abraham's God decided to test him. He asked Abraham to make a sacrifice of his and Sarah's only child, Isaac, their miracle, who was born to them when Sarah was ninety years old and Abraham was one hundred. And ... Abraham complied.'

'He did not ask what was wrong with a God who would demand such a thing, or question whether He was worth worshipping. He did

not, so far as the

Bible tells us, even beg for Isaac's life, as he had done for the people of Sodom. Abraham simply walked his child up Mount Moriah. I imagine he even made the boy carry the wood for the fire ...'

- ...I have regarded for some years now the story of Abraham and Isaac a strange story, a grim tale of how a father would sacrifice his son to his own faith ... What kind of a starting point is this for ...all the Western faiths? ... Why do we re-tell this story? Is it to remind us that every parent since has been better?'
- ...One of the thousand morals of the story of Abraham and Isaac is that ...it is also a tale of survival and of mercy. In the end Abraham heard his God instruct him not to set his hand against his son ...Isaac survived ...He became a parent, blind to Jacob's defects, but one who, pointedly, attempted no sacrifices of his own ...'

'So let us think of Isaac ...the first son of the Western faiths - and think about the story that is told again and again. We hear it first as children, and repeat it throughout our lives. We tell it by way of apology. And warning. We tell it with some measure of hope. We tell it because we have all been the child, we have all been Isaac, and we know the part of the story that is never mentioned. For the Bible does not record Isaac's responses. We do not know if he. like Jesus, asked, "Father, why have you forsaken me?"

We do not know if he begged the way most of us would, for his life. We know only this: that he obeyed ... That because he knew nothing else, he did as his father required. We know he allowed himself to be bound in rope. We know that he let his father lav him on the altar of pyramided firewood which together they had raised to God. /

Lent at St Michael's:

Works of Mercy in Lent

Pope Francis said: "The season of Lent is a good time to listen to God's word by practicing the works of mercy. In the corporal works of mercy we touch the flesh of Christ in our brothers and sisters who need to be fed, clothed, sheltered, visited; in the spiritual works of mercy – counsel, instruction, forgiveness, admonishment and prayer – we touch more directly our own sinfulness. The corporal and spiritual works of mercy must never be separated."

The early Christian mystic John Chrysostom said: "No act of virtue can be great if it is not followed by advantage for others. So, no matter how much time you spend fasting, no matter how much you sleep on a hard floor and eat ashes and sigh continually, if you do no good to others, you do nothing great."

Lent is a good time for penance and self-denial. But <u>Francis reminds us that these activities must truly enrich</u> others: "I distrust a charity that costs nothing and does not hurt."

So, if you're going to fast from anything this Lent he suggests that even more than sweets or alcohol, you need to fast from indifference towards others.

There's is no need to throw out the chocolate, booze, and carbs. "When we fast from indifference, we can begin to feast on love. In fact, Lent is the perfect time to learn how to love again. If you want to change your body, perhaps giving up alcohol and sugary treats is the way to go. But if you want to change your heart, a harder fast is needed. That narrow road is gritty, but it isn't sterile. It will make room in ourselves to experience a love that can make us whole and set us free."

During Lent it is good to refresh our memories about the works of Mercy.

The Physical Works of Mercy

To feed the hungry. To give drink to the thirsty. To clothe the naked. To visit and ransom prisoners. To shelter the homeless. To visit the sick. To bury the dead.

The Spiritual Works of Mercy

To instruct the ignorant. To counsel the doubtful. To admonish sinners. To comfort the sorrowful. To bear wrongs patiently. To forgive all injuries. To pray for the living and the dead.

What can we do that's practical?

We could look within our own families and in our parish to see where loneliness exists.

Pope Francis constantly brings up the lonely elderly who exist among us. He told this story. "I remember, when I was visiting a retirement home, I spoke with each person and I frequently heard this: "How are you? And your children? Well, well. How many do you have? Many. And do they come to visit you? Oh sure, yes, always, yes, they come. When was the last time they came?" I remember an elderly woman who said to me: "Mmm, for Christmas". It was August! Eight months without being visited by her children, abandoned for eight months! This is called mortal sin!"

"Once as a child, a grandmother told me the story of an old grandfather who got dirty while eating because he couldn't easily bring the spoonful of soup to his mouth. And his son decided to move him from the dinner table and set up a little table in the kitchen to eat alone, so he couldn't be seen. In this way he wouldn't make a bad impression when friends came over to lunch or dinner. A few days later, that son came home and found his youngest child playing with some wood and a hammer and nails, he was making something there. His father said: "What are you making? — I'm making a table, papa. — A table, why? — To have one for when you grow old, so that you can eat out there with grandpa". Children are more aware than we are!"

Pope Francis reminds us we will all be old one day.

We know he watched his father on the mountaintop raise the gleaming knife above his breastbone. We know ...he was a child, the son of a man with a Big Idea, who in his longing and confusion, even in his final instant, could only look to

his father with that eternal if foundering hope for love?

May this story and our Eucharist give us hope that no matter what altar of sacrifice we feel sometimes laid upon, God does not abandon us in our need, and never wants us to

sacrifice ourselves, or anyone else. Lent is about mercy and survival because true obedience to God, even in its demands for a hard love, ALWAYS leads to life.
