### Reflection by Richard Leonard SJ

In recent years the Ten Commandments have become an unusual staging ground for various groups within the Church. Some people complain that young Catholics don't know them off by heart. This position is countered by those who say that rather than being able to recite them we should live them, though it's hard to see how we can do one without the other. Still, others rightly claim that Jesus summarised them in his new commandments, 'To love God with all our heart, mind and soul and to love our neighbour as we love ourselves.'

The problem with teaching the Ten Commandments is not what they say, but how they say it. The idea of 'coveting' anything, but especially 'wives, slaves, ox and ass' are all a bit dated these days.

In

an article

entitled 'Preaching to the Modern Pagans' journalist Bryan Appleyard tells how he interviewed a person who kept quoting them at length. Later he decided to read them for the first time since childhood and he was struck by their insightfulness into the human character. Appleyard thought all the Ten Commandments needed was a makeover so that we can reclaim the power of them.

'You shall have no other gods beside me.' Be serious!

'You shall not carve idols for yourselves ... nor bow down before them.' Get real! 'You shall not take the name of the Lord,

your God, in vain.' Be humble!

'Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day ...' Be quiet!

'Honour your father and your mother ...' Respect age!

'You shall not kill.' Do not kill, for all murder is suicide!

'You shall not commit adultery.' Mean what you say!

'You shall not steal.' Do not steal, or all the world will die!

'You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour.' Honour others, their frailties are usually your own!

'You shall not covet your neighbour's house or wife ... Be kind, be generous and don't play around!

So by putting some ancient words into the modern vernacular we are exhorted this Sunday to seriousness, facing reality, humility, creating space, respecting age, honesty, and fidelity, and we are bluntly told to stop killing and stealing. There is nothing old fashioned about these challenges. As in other instances, we can see that it's not what our tradition has to say but the way we say it that can be the problem. */Cont'd P4...*

## Lent at St Michael's:

### *Lenten reflection:* The Miracle of Forgiveness

### One of the most productive disciplines we can undertake for Lent is to forgive offenses willingly (one of the key spiritual works of Mercy).

So much anger and resentment exists today in the Church, and society, at many levels. The tragedy is that if we do not forgive those who hurt us, we slowly destroy our own peace of mind and become paralysed, unable to move forward. But forgiveness and healing are possible. In 2008 a Samoan family extended forgiveness to a young man who had killed their son in a pub fight. A Court verdict ruled 'accidental death'. Amazingly the family of the dead man wept and embraced the young, accused rugby player, in an expression of forgiveness, some kissing his cheek.

One female relative told him (after kissing him) that she hoped his life would change for the good: "You will always be in our prayers". The accused young man shed tears as he embraced the deceased man's sisters and nieces and a nephew, who had travelled from Samoa and New Zealand for the trial that ran for seven days. These Samoan relatives also embraced and kissed the Australian defendant's parents and relatives, who were weeping as the jury brought in their verdict. Both families were like two sporting teams leaving a playing field, embracing, hugging, weeping and kissing.

The Sydney detective sergeant, who had charge of the case throughout, said of the Samoan family: "They are simply the nicest family I have ever encountered. A deeply religious and loving family who heard the evidence and prayed constantly throughout the trial, not only for the defendant, but for his family, the judge, the jury, the legal counsels and the police. I have never seen anything like this in my career as a police officer; the ability of people to accept and forgive." Before leaving the court, the family joined hands in a room and held a collective prayer for the young man who accidentally killed their son. How is such forgiveness possible? It defies belief at one level, given the human desire for revenge, which is so deep in all of us. Clearly, the remarkable love and compassion of this Samoan family can only have come from a divine source.

The Jewish philosopher Hannah Arendt once said that Jesus of Nazareth introduced forgiveness into the human condition. For her, the power to forgive is Jesus' greatest miracle.

A blessing of our Catholic Tradition is that forgiveness, healing and mercy are readily accessible in the sacrament of Reconciliation. But also we need to remember the importance of community reconciliation within our families and within our parish.

#### MAKE YOUR EASTER CHOCOLATE SLAVERY FREE

Pope Francis said that "every person ought to have the awareness that purchasing is always a moral - and not simply an economic - act". Can't find slavery-free Easter eggs in your supermarket? Ten years ago there was almost no slavery-free chocolate in our supermarkets. Now, because of public pressure, most supermarkets will sell some. ALDI has a huge range of slaver-free chocolate. Look for chocolate that has one of the following symbols: "Fair Trade", "Rainforest Alliance Certified" or "UTZ Certified".

And today's Gospel tells us of the consequences of moving away from these guiding principles. I think we need to take Jesus' anger very seriously. Rightly we have emphasised the love and compassion of Jesus over recent decades because for far too long the steadfast love of Christ was under-emphasised. We should never think,

however, that it cancels out the anger God feels when he sees an unjust world filled with people who know better and do nothing.

God has given us the Ten Commandments, the Law, the Prophets and Jesus his Son, so that we might know the Way, the Truth and the Life. When we are called to account for how we spent our lives, whom we loved and how we made the world a better place for all, most of us will not be able to plead ignorance. May our Eucharist this Sunday enable us to be mindful of what the Ten Commandments say, but even more may it give us the courage and strength to live them out in a world that needs witnesses to them more than ever.
