SCHOOL PRINCIPALS:

s Christians in the world we cannot help but be influenced by the developments that happen around us. Indeed, we believe that many of these advances are gifts from God, given to us to enjoy. But not all developments in thinking and practices are for the better.

One recent and alarming development is the false thinking that we cannot judge other people, or that we should not be judged. The wider community regularly maintains that no one is in a position to judge another's behaviour or statements. This approach holds that everyone's words and actions are of equal value. This position is many things, but it's certainly not Christian, but this hasn't stopped it from finding a home amongst us. We regularly hear statements from Christian men and women like, 'We're not in a

position to judge' or 'You can't judge them' and 'If it's fine for them, then it's fine'. This thinking has a name. It's called moral relativism and it tries to claim that the morality of behaviour is only determined by the person who does the act, or the context within which the action is taken.

Our Catholic tradition teaches us that a context is very important in trying to work out if someone is to blame for what they say and do, but that a person's particular circumstances never change the fact that the words or actions are in themselves wrong. We hold that while all human beings have equal value and dignity, we do not believe that everyone's opinion and actions are of equal worth. We believe that 'right judgment' is a gift of the Holy Spirit and that it's best exercised with humility and compassion.

When I hear people say I should not judge

others, I assume they are telling me that I should not condemn other people. There is a world of difference between judging and condemning. To judge is to make an assessment. To condemn is to damn.

As Christians we judge because we have to keep discerning how the things of the world can be reconciled with the things we hold to be true. Condemnation is the prerogative of God alone, who sees all, knows all and loves all. In today's Gospel, however, John tells us that even God has forfeited the right to condemn the world, but has sent Jesus to be the world's light, life, truth and saviour.

The Gospel reminds us that if we feel condemned for what we have done and said, then it's because we have condemned ourselves, not because God condemns us. /Cont'd P4...

Lent at St Michael's:

Lenten reflection: The persecution of Christians is escalating.

Rome's Colosseum was lit up in red on the 24th February, an event aimed at highlighting the persecution of Christians which has been steadily on the rise in the Middle East, parts of Asia and Africa.

The amphitheatre of ancient Rome was the execution site for the early Christians and the event was designed to draw attention to the continuing persecution of Christians around the world more than 2,000 years later. Along with the Colosseum, prominent buildings in Christian persecution hotspots such as Mosul in Iraq and Aleppo in Syria were also be bathed in red light. It was an act of solidarity with persecuted Christians, and in particular Asia Bibi, a woman condemned to death under Pakistan's blasphemy laws.

Before the event Pope Francis held a private audience with the husband and daughter of Asia Bibi, imprisoned for an alleged offence against the Prophet Mohammed. She has always denied the offence. This Catholic woman has been living on death row in Pakistan since 2009, when she was condemned for allegedly making derogatory remarks about Islam after fellow workers and her neighbours objected to her drinking water from their communal glass because she was not Muslim. She was impure because she was a Christian.

Amnesty International says the blasphemy law is increasingly exploited by religious extremists as well as ordinary Pakistanis to settle personal scores.

"The aim of the blasphemy laws is crush people who believe differently," Archbishop Nunzio Galantino, secretary-general of the Italian Bishops Conference, told the Colosseum gathering.

The law does not define blasphemy and evidence cannot be given in court for fear of committing another blasphemy by witnesses repeating the words. There are no penalties for false accusations. Asia Bibi's case drew international attention after the assassination of two Muslim politicians who tried to intervene on her behalf.

Pope Francis says Asia Bibi is a martyr and a model for our society that today is afraid of pain. This Lent we should direct our prayers and energies to supporting our sisters and brothers suffering for their belief in the good news of Jesus Christ and especially those with cmmitment to the Catholic Faith. Wherever they are, they are in our hearts.

John tells us that even when we find ourselves lost in the darkness of our most destructive behaviour, the saving love of Christ is always available to us, inviting us to come out of the darkness into his light.

What a great metaphor the light and dark is for making the best judgments in our

own lives. Alarm bells should always ring when we find ourselves not wanting anyone else to know what we have said or done. Secrecy is often the ally of sin and the more open and transparent we are, the more confident we can be that we are walking as children of the light.

May this Lenten Eucharist enable us to let go of the desire to condemn others and ourselves, and to receive again the compassionate, just and humble gift of right judgment that helps us to see the darkness for what it is, and keeps us walking in the light of Christ.
