Reflection by Richard Leonard SJ

SCHOOL PRINCIPALS:

The earliest Christian community focused strongly on the wounds of the Risen Lord for two reasons: to affirm the fact that Christ, now raised from the dead was the same person who had lived with them; and to make sense of the physical wounds being inflicted on them for Christ's sake.

The story of Thomas, even with its mystical details, counters a magical notion of what the resurrection is about. Jesus bears the marks of his torture and death. His glorified body, though different, is connected to how the disciples knew and loved him. They can recognise him through his words and his wounds.

We know the community of Ephesus, for which this Gospel is written, was experiencing great persecution. Is it any wonder, one generation after the earliest disciples, that the sign of Christ's Risen

presence are his marks of suffering?

Our own world continues to be intrigued by manifestations of Jesus' wounds. Over recent years films like Stigmata, Dogma, Agnes of God and even the appalling Daredevil give a hysterical and cynical prominence to the stigmata. There are regular 'believe it or not' documentaries that usually follow suit. Even some pilgrims flocked to Padre Pio's monastery in the south of Italy to see if his hands really bled, or if his wounds really wept. This desire to see outward signs of inner faith is a long way short of Jesus telling us today, 'Happy are those who believe without seeing.'

Our day-to-day lives should be the clearest manifestation of the cross and resurrection of Christ.

It seems, however, that words and wounds still make a claim on us today. You and I know that we don't have to go to a stigmatic to see Christian battle wounds. We carry within us the death of the Lord. We all have our wounds. And we also know that, for many of us, it is precisely when we are wounded most deeply by life, that our doubts in the presence of God can be greatest.

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The Easter story is not that we should be ashamed of this, or pretend it doesn't happen. Today's Gospel reminds us that it is into this chaos that Christ comes with words of peace, with empathy from the one who was wounded for our sake and with the mission to forgive as we are forgiven.

Years ago I remember struggling with some personal issues during a retreat. One day, when I felt lowest about myself, the retreat director, adapting today's psalm, 117, said to me, 'you realise that the stone rejected by the builder becomes the corner stone'. /Cont'd P4...

What the hell has cricket got to do with it?

A friend of mine from overseas is dumbfounded by the brouhaha over the cheating by the Australian cricket team. "Have you people no sense of proportion? It's only a game. Your media has gone crazy. There are more important issues to focus on." In defence of the poor man, he is American and doesn't understand cricket.

He doesn't realise that this story is an Australian parable, understood by most Australians to be a commentary on fairness and decency. Jesus would have told such a story. Just as he drew on his observations of rural life and the hard working labourers who tended the fields, the vineyards and the animals; just as he illustrated his stories about big moral issues with tales of humble folk going about their daily business, Jesus would have exploited the potential of ball tampering to illustrate a larger truth.

At the start of the 20th Century Australia could boast a raft of social policies that put us ahead of the pack. Before other nations we had the 40 hour week, the vote for women, dole for the unemployed, conciliation and arbitration to determine a living wage for workers. That was our heroic achievement. That was what we celebrated. Not victory in war; not violent revolution; not cultural dominance. We worked towards the quieter satisfaction of proclaiming 'fairness' as one of our defining national characteristics.

What happened on the cricket field in South Africa points to a wider corruption in our culture. Greedy franchises use business models that make it impossible for franchisees to make a living or pay their workers decent wages. Financial advisors give their vulnerable clients crap advice for personal gain. Banks cheat. Politicians look after number one. Global companies engineer their affairs to avoid tax and would have us believe that their main business office is located on a Pacific atoll measuring one square kilometre.

We've become less God fearing, more individualistic, more materialistic and more self-centred. We've become less community-minded, less committed to 'solidarity' (where the strong happily pay their taxes to help the poor do better) and less sympathetic to the battlers (except when we kid ourselves that *we* are the battlers).

But don't imagine the greed is limited to businesses and institutions. Almost all of us aspire to paying as little tax as possible while demanding free public hospitals, subsidised pharmaceuticals, bulk-billed GP visits and much else. We've become a nation of whingers who can't recognize our own good fortune.

What do Harold Mitchell (wealthy Australian businessman), Warren Buffet (the planet's third richest man) and JK Rowling (author of Harry Potter) have in common apart from being mega rich? They all believe in paying their taxes. Mitchell wrote: "I believe in the Australian system that creates the sort of society that enabled me to build a successful business. Avoiding tax, even if it seems legal, is a very short sighted ambition." Rowling said:

"I pay a lot of tax, and I feel one of the reasons I stay and pay and why I'm not based in Monaco ... is I think my country helped me." All three believe it's not all 'just about me'.

By this he meant that often God takes that part of ourselves we don't like, forgives it, heals it, and uses it most powerfully to demonstrate that the pattern of the life, death and resurrection of Christ continues in all believers who bear his name and carry his wounds.

And that's what happened to Thomas. Christ took his fears, doubts and disbelief and transformed them into a powerful Christian witness that has sustained generations of us who struggle with life and faith.

So at this Easter Eucharist we are offered the same opportunity to discover that the stone

rejected within us, or among us, is the one which God wants to use as the cornerstone. When we see this happening, when we see God taking the part of us we consider most unlovable and using it for good, then we want to cry out with the psalmist, 'This is the work of the Lord, a marvel in our eyes.'
