

Reflection by Richard Leonard SJ

n years gone by the major focus of this feast of Corpus Christi was a procession that usually concluded with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Many of us have fond memories of Benediction: a bejewelled cope and monstrance, the flickering candles, the Divine Praises and Latin hymns. It all worked to create a magical atmosphere. As richly theatrical as it was, the magical side of it was part of the problem.

In medieval times Catholics rarely received Holy Communion. So much so it was in this context that the Church ruled that we have to communicate at least once a year. In the absence of communion, veneration of the Blessed Sacrament took on a great significance. Seeing the host was thought to impart an intense power.

Although in the last 100 years we have been encouraged to receive communion more frequently, the magical properties ascribed to the host persist in some people's devotional thinking.

As Catholics we believe that Jesus is really and personally present to us in the broken bread and shared cup of the Eucharist. And although we believe that Christ is present in the Scriptures, the assembly and the ministers of the Church, we hold that Christ's presence under the form of bread and wine is one filled with the greatest intimacy and uniqueness.

The Eucharist is not intimate and unique because it is magic. It's not intimate and unique because we gaze upon the elements. The Eucharist is intimate and unique because earthly signs are transformed by God's love, and are consumed in faith. As we eat and drink these elements Christ becomes part of us, and we come alive in Christ.

In the fifth century Saint Augustine taught his people that if they truly loved the Eucharist they would become what they eat. The same is true for us today. By receiving into our hands the bread – blessed and broken, the cup – poured and shared, we say 'Amen' to becoming the same in Christ: blessed, broken, poured out and shared in love. We commune with God and God with us in the Eucharist so that just as earthly gifts are transformed into Christ so through us will be the entire world, and all things in it.

There is a huge and important difference between grace and magic. One is a trick for show. The other is the power of love, which expresses itself in faith, hope and service.

In a profound poem French Jesuit Didier Rimaud challenges those of us who love the Eucharist to see it linked to the liberation begun in the Exodus, consummated in the Resurrection and working in our world today.

The Kerang train disaster

Do you remember the Kerang train crash in 2007? Eleven people died and 23 were injured. Four children were among the dead. And to make the pain even more unbearable the truck driver (who crashed into the train at a level crossing) was acquitted of 11 charges of culpable driving and 8 counts of negligently causing serious injury by a Supreme Court jury in 2009.

Then followed a Coroner's report in 2011 that reopened the wounds of families of the victims by not identifying someone to blame for the tragedy. The Coroner found there were many reasons for the deaths: inadequate infrastructure and warning systems at the state's level crossings, lack of coordination of emergency services and lack of first aid equipment on trains and tools for removing seats in the event of a crash etc. And finally just random accident.

But the families of some victims said they were expecting more from the recommendations. What they wanted was someone to blame. One devastated parent said: "We don't feel like we've achieved anything; we don't feel like anyone's put their hand up and said they're to blame. Who's to blame? Someone has to be blamed but who is it?" Another said: "I haven't had any satisfaction yet from any investigation that has taken place and I don't think that we're going to find any satisfaction here because we still have so many questions that are unanswered." When asked what questions she wanted answered she replied simply: "Who was to blame?"

It's hard to acknowledge the unavoidable randomness of life events. As a result of this Coronial enquiry (and others as well) the state's crossings are being upgraded, changes have been made to emergency services (e.g. the rural ambulance service is now part of Ambulance Victoria), coordination of and communication between emergency services agencies has been overhauled, trucks now have to have their brakes checked regularly and trains now have emergency equipment. But all of that amounts to nothing without someone to blame. Because tragedy breeds anger and anger demands retribution. And without retribution victims feel unsatisfied.

Jesus gave us a way out of this impasse. He said we must let go of resentments and forgive those who have wronged us so that we ourselves may experience God's forgiveness. Pope Francis said: "This can be particularly difficult when we carry with us a list of things that have been done to us. God's forgiveness is felt strongly within us as long as we forgive others. And this isn't easy because grudges make a nest in our heart and there is always that bitterness."

Francis said: "Accusing ourselves is the first step toward forgiveness. To accuse one's self is part of Christian wisdom. No, not accusing others; accusing ourselves." When we get into the habit of reflecting on our own shortcomings it is easier to forgive the shortcomings of those other fellow travelers on this earth.

Let us forgive each other. Only then will we find peace. (Leo Tolstoy) When you forgive you in no way change the past - but you sure do change the future.
