Subverting the Social Order

This is a story of subversion, subversion of the social order turned upside down by the healing presence of Jesus.

Jesus is approached by one of the local elite: a male, with a name [Jairus], prestige, an advocate for his twelve year old daughter, and he knows the correct procedure, adopting a deferential posture. Jesus hears his request to heal his daughter and sets off.

Jesus' progress is stopped in its tracks by a contrary figure: a woman, with no name, voiceless, because of her haemorrhaging blood ostracised from social and religious contacts, and she adopted the utterly wrong approach. She touched Jesus, or at least his clothing, which risked contaminating him with her 'uncleanness'. But she was immediately healed. This voiceless, marginalised woman was healed at every

level of her person: physical, social and religious. She could now mix with people and attend the synagogue. All the woman needed to do was get close and have faith that Jesus would restore her to a life worthy of a human being.

By the way, that is the best way to approach confession. You or I should come into the confessional conscious of whatever is making one ill-at-ease with God because of something one has done or failed to do. Bring that dis-ease into close proximity to Jesus as the Divine Physician. The confessional is 'the hem of his cloak'.

But to return to the Gospel. Jesus stops and looks around: 'Who touched me?' The disciples are unreconstructed supporters of the social status quo. They regard stopping to find out who touched Jesus as an unfortunate and rather misguided interruption to the important task of continuing on to the house of the local leader, the male at the top of the social scale who had so properly pleaded on behalf of his daughter.

But, Jesus does stop and one of the most beautiful moments in the Gospel ensues. The woman gets her voice back, tells Jesus it was she who had broken all the taboos and touched him. He turns to her and says: 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace and be healed of vour disease.'

He, Our Lord Jesus Christ, calls the outcast who had endured social isolation for twelve years, 'Daughter'. This woman heard this term of relationship, this term of affection and care, 'Daughter', from the lips of Jesus. Can you imagine the liberating and joyful effect of hearing that title of honour and love from Our Lord?

Yes, Jesus went on to heal the little girl. But unlike the disciples he did not regard stopping as an interruption. It was a priority which totally subverted the expectations and the power structures of that society. /Cont'd P4...

Do you remember how it was?

For most of the 20th Century until the 1960's Australian society was dominated by a Protestant Ascendancy, made up of Anglicans (then known as the Church of England), Presbyterians, Methodists and Baptists. In all sorts of ways Catholics were made to feel they were outsiders. This was at the tail end of a period during which the patriotism and loyalty of Catholics of Irish origin was seriously questioned.

At that time most Catholics in Australia had Irish ancestry and most were sympathetic to the Irish struggle for independence from Britain. That horrified many Australian Protestants who saw loyalty to the British Empire as the foundation of Australian patriotism. It was made worse after the Irish rose up in violent rebellion. There was a tendency, particularly in the media, to condemn all Catholics because the Irish Republican Army was involved in terrorist activities. All Catholics were potential terrorists and subversives.

That cultural divide played out in the schools. As Catholic school children passed the local state school they often heard: "Catholic dogs, jump like frogs, eat no meat on Friday." The Catholic battle cry in retaliation was: "Catholics, Catholics ring the bell, and all the Proddies go to hell." Fights sometimes followed these taunts.

All this might seem trivial and quaintly amusing these days. But there are lots of ways little children can be made to feel outsiders. As a result of the tensions in the Protestant/Catholic divide some Catholic children didn't feel they quite fitted into our society. Many felt anxious. Many non-Catholic children formed the firm belief that they could never be friends with a Catholic. Words matter in shaping a child's sense of identity. The practical solution was that society divided into religious ghettos. People mixed only with those they felt secure among.

Now we have the 'sectarians' back. They don't see Catholics as the danger to our society as was the case through the first half of the last century. (But make no mistake; with their mind set they would have denounced Catholics as a danger had they been around at the time). They appear to have stopped condemning Asians. It's now Muslims and Africans who are the Nation's dangerous subversives. It may be possible for rational adults to put into perspective exaggerations about being swamped by Muslims. (After all only 2.2% of the population is Muslim). But by the time the message filters down to the immature minds of children it becomes a template for how they should think about our society. Non-Muslim children are programmed to hate Muslims. And Muslim children hear themselves described as outsiders; condemned as would-be terrorists before they have the chance to figure where they fit in the Australian community.

Hard right 'Nationalists' and their supporters help to make school life a misery for a generation of Muslim kids. The playground could become a mine field on the journey to adulthood. And their divisiveness will be perpetuated because young children will be loath to form friendships with children of "the other sort"; as happened before the Catholic/Protestant divide collapsed at the end of the 1960's.

Looking back it's truly amazing how abruptly those old hatreds disappeared in the late 1960s. How did we manage to do that?
