know very few people these days who work from 9.00am to 5.00pm. The eight-hour day seems to be a thing of the past. Where priests regularly encounter these new work patterns is when we see young people who are preparing for marriage in the Church. Sometimes to arrange a meeting we have to resort to a 6.30am or 10.00pm meeting. Some young people are working sixty hours a week. They take work home and work on the weekends. We know from surveys that they eat out most of the time. they party hard when they get the chance, and that Sunday is spent on the home front, going to the gym or sleeping. Then on Monday they start the process again.

Two things drive this obsessive work practice: competition in the job market, and the financial bonuses offered to the employees. The problem is that this practice cannot be a long-term strategy. At

the other end of the scale we all know people, only in their 30s and 40s, who are burnt out and feel used by a ruthless commercial market-place.

This culture of exhaustion is not confined to the young corporate raiders. Most people in our country have never worked as hard, with so many claims on our time and energies.

Excessive demands on one's time, no matter how great the needs and rewards, were issues for Jesus and the Apostles as well. The best translation of the Greek text for today's gospel says that after the apostles returned from their missionary journeys 'there were many coming and going and they had no leisure, even to eat'.

Jesus' call to 'come away to some lonely place all by yourselves and rest for a while' is not just about good work practises and ethical employment policy. It is about humanising our work, making sense of what we do and seeing our work as means to an end, not an end in itself.

Original sin

he Good News is that God, in the person of the man Jesus, revealed himself to the world and offered to save all those who dedicate their lives to Him. The implication is that human beings need to be 'saved from something' and are not capable of saving themselves. That is not such good news and rather perplexing. And all this was a bit of a mystery for the original disciples. The gospel had a name for the problem: sin; but not a clear explanation of why this is so.

It was the theologian Augustine of Hippo (354-430 AD) who shone a bright light on the problem by putting it within the framework of a very powerful story: The expulsion from the Garden of Eden. Genesis tells a story about the first humans, Adam and Eve. They disobeyed God's command. As punishment they were expelled from Eden and were required to earn their food by the sweat of their brow, bring forth children in pain and, at the end of it all, die.

It's possible to interpret this story in a number of ways. That's what gives it its power. But Augustine chose a single interpretation that had very bad news indeed. Adam and Eve should have lived in blissful happiness in Eden forever, in unquestioning obedience to God. Whatever they did was so utterly sinful that God shattered this idyllic dream. (Surely it can't have been as a result of eating some fruit. That action must have been a symbol of something else). Augustine saw this eating of the fruit not as an admirable grasping for new knowledge or an exciting new experience; but damnable disobedience.

Under Augustine's interpretation the news gets worse. And here Augustine moved way beyond what the original story tells us. He stated that their action was driven by their very human nature and that this 'weakness' was inherited by every member of the human race coming after them. It is important at this point to realize that Augustine believed not only that Adam and Eve were the real biological parents of the human race but that sexual reproduction was the way the sin was passed on. So according to him we are all born damaged goods.

You are left wondering what Augustine's interpretation would have been had he known about evolution. As one of the great intellectuals of his time he is unlikely to have ignored that information.

But back to the story. This 'original sin' damage is so serious that there is nothing humans can do to put it right. All they can do is reject their own deepest instincts and desires, particularly sexual desires, and throw themselves on the mercy of the savior Jesus Christ.

Not everyone was prepared to go all the way with Augustine. In particular Eastern Christianity did not accept his belief in the total corruption of human beings. And in the west Thomas Aquinas believed that humans had enough natural virtue in their makeup to understand God's plan and play a significant role in their own salvation.

We can be forgiven for being skeptical about Augustine's scenario. First, because nothing even remotely like his interpretation was ever recorded as coming from Jesus' mouth; second because modern scientific knowledge (which is another way in which God's truth is revealed to us) makes the Adam and Eve story, as a factual account, implausible. So is there a better modern explanation of Original Sin?

The Church teaches that the first humans lost the original innocence they had received from God. They did this by a sin that not only lost 'holy' innocence for themselves but for all humans. They transmitted to their descendants a human nature wounded by that first sin ("original sin"). As a result of original sin, human nature is weakened in its powers, subject to ignorance, suffering and the domination of death, and inclined to sin. Could that have been an evolutionary process rather than a single dramatic incident over eating an apple?

The Church teaches that every human person born on this earth is made in the image of God. Within humans there exists both a powerful surge toward good because we are made in the image of God, and darker impulses that drag us toward evil. But the Church explicitly denies that we inherit *guilt* from anyone, maintaining that instead we inherit our fallen nature.

To be human is to be divine. But even the best human when it thirsts drinks from stagnant waters.

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Rest from work is a key factor in the success of all three aspects being achieved in any community. A culture of exhaustion militates against them. The bottom line in all this is appropriate boundaries.

Mark tells us today that though Jesus was moved to compassion by the

needs of the crowd, he also knew that their needs were not the only ones that had to be met. Jesus teaches his disciples and us that the balance between work and rest is an obligation of faith. This applies equally to work inside and outside the family home.

So this Sunday's Gospel carries a critical message for the modern world. Rest,

recreation and leisure are not indulgences about which we should feel guilty. They are rights defended by Christ and protect our human dignity.
