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#### Reflection by Richard Leonard SJ

round the world there are women's shelters run by the St Vincent de Paul Society called 'Manna House'. It's an inspired name for such an important work. Women and their children, in the midst of fear, and having suffered terrible abuse, are welcomed into a safe-haven where they can be loved and looked after. It's a temporary respite where broken families can piece their lives back together and be revived for the journey ahead.

What happens at 'Manna Houses' for women at risk happens for each of us when we come to the Eucharist. We receive manna from heaven. It's our stop on the journey of faith so that we can go out spiritually revived to be the face of Christ in the world. Sometimes we need this 'manna come down from

heaven' when we are spiritually most at-risk.

I love the fact that as Catholics we believe that Christ is present in ordinary gifts of bread and wine blessed and offered at the Eucharist. We don't just believe that Christ is present in sunrises, sunsets and in natural beauty, we also believe that God comes to us in a special and unique way in the simple, ordinary things of life. And it is in what we do with these gifts of bread and wine that Christ is really present. The earliest Christians called the Eucharist 'the breaking of the bread'. It is the broken bread and the poured cup given into our hands to which we say 'Amen' and so affirm our belief that Christ is present here.

We often need to be reassured of Christ's presence when we are in the desert periods of our own life. We can feel we are wandering around in the wilderness looking for some sign of God's life. For all of us who are broken in mind, body or spirit, or who are pouring ourselves out in love for other people, communion is precisely the time Jesus meets us where we are. Is it any wonder that the Eucharist means so much to us? May we never feel as though we are not good enough to be here, for Jesus has invited us to his table where we are loved and cared for.

As important as the Eucharist is, however, it is not 'ours', in the sense that we can selfishly hold on to the gifts we receive here. We are given Christ in Word and Sacrament, so we can become Christ.

The upcoming Plenary Council in 2020 gives us a chance to focus once again on the role of families and women in the life of the Church.

Pour years ago The Synod on the Family in Rome tried to tackle the issue. The Synod expressed the key issues in the following words:

"Within the family are joys and trials, deep love and relationships which, at times, can be wounded. The family is truly the "school of humanity" (*Gaudium et Spes*, 52), which is much needed today. Despite the many signs of crisis in the family institution in various areas of the "global village", the desire to marry and form a family remains vibrant, especially among young people, and serves as the basis of the need of the Church, an expert in humanity and faithful to her mission to proclaim untiringly and with profound conviction the "Gospel of the Family", entrusted to her together with the revelation of God's love in Jesus Christ and ceaselessly taught by the Fathers, the masters of spirituality and the Church's Magisterium. The family is uniquely important to the Church and in these times, when all believers are invited to think of others rather than themselves, the family needs to be rediscovered as the essential agent in the work of evangelization. Think of the witness of so many families that fulfill their Christian mission." Our Plenary Council needs to find words that speak more directly to Australian Catholics; and use sentences that are shorter and pithier.

The 2014 Synod documents placed a great deal of emphasis on the vulnerability of families. For example they claimed that there is "a general feeling of powerlessness in the face of socio-cultural realities that oftentimes end in crushing families". They give little acknowledgement to the resilience of most families. Those sentiments may express the reality of families in some parts of the world but not in Australia. In Australian society the majority of families have coped well with dynamic social change, even those who have abandoned any commitment to religion as a guide to their lives.

Divorce is often used as an indication of the extent to which families end up 'crushed' by the forces of social change. Yet in Australia the majority of marriages do not end in divorce. The statistics report that the divorce rate in the group of people who married 25 years ago is about 32 per cent. This means that 68 per cent of marriages survive (at least in the formal sense) until one partner dies.

In an Australian context there are, indeed, families who become overwhelmed by social pressures. And to give them their due Australian governments of both political persuasions have done a reasonable job of supporting families through dynamic social change. Some of their policies have not been compatible with church teachings (e.g. contraception and abortion policies) and some social problems seem almost intractable (e.g. aboriginal health and education issues). But in this society research has shown that parents spend more quality time with their children than they did 20 years ago. Parents also expect more from their children than they did 20 years ago, including the expectation of being considerate and polite. Most studies have failed to find any evidence that the quality of parent-child relationships had declined over time, and that there is little evidence of any decline in commitment to parenting across most of Australia's population.

The Church's role is to persist in messages that help families put their own situations into some kind of Christian perspective. This message will need to be different in this society than others around the world. The role of women in the Church and in the family is a critical issue in this society. We need to separate the debate about the ordination of women from a debate about their leadership role in the Church. Senior leadership positions need not be the exclusive prerogative of priests. Here is just one example to consider:

It may be the case that Jesus made an unalterable decision when he divinely ordained an 'all male' ministry. What is not in dispute is that Jesus had no opinion on, and no hand in establishing, the role of 'cardinal'. This is a position not divinely ordained. It is an historical construct devised a thousand years after Christ to solve administrative problems in a burgeoning Church bureaucracy. Furthermore, over the centuries many cardinals have not been ordained priests.

In 2013 Cardinal Timothy Dolan of New York proposed that women should be considered "given that red hats do not necessarily have to be proffered only to clergy". The up-coming Plenary Council needs to embrace that kind of lateral thinking.

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In a sense Jesus says the same thing in today's Gospel when he talks about how the Father draws people to faith.

Sometimes we can fall into the trap of thinking that faith is only an intellectual exercise. As important as good thinking and the power of

strong arguments might be, the truth of faith is best demonstrated on an emotional and intuitive level when others see the power of God's saving love active in the way we live our lives. This is what really captures people's attention, and draws them to ask what gives our lives this quality, direction, purpose and meaning.

So may this respite from the journey of faith dispel our fears, revive us for the task ahead and enable us to live as though the only Bible others will read will be our lives, and the only Sacraments that will captivate them and draw them to Christ will be our justice and joy.
