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Reflection by Richard Leonard SJ

It's hard to see what the disciples don't get when Jesus tells them in fairly plain language that because of the way he lives and what he says he will be put to death by the power barons of his day. The disciples seem to think the Passion is going to be an event out of Boy's Own Annual, where the ensuing campaign will see greatness thrust upon them. In this context, Jesus takes the smallest and most vulnerable of people in their society and teaches the disciples that greatness comes through care of the least.

This is a powerful lesson. Greatness in the world – power, connections, wealth, influence, reputation and learning – only counts for something in the Kingdom of God when put at the service of the most vulnerable of our society. Greed, riches and pride

are so alluring, so seductive for us in the Church, as much as for those outside it, that we need to regularly examine our consciences to assess the motivations and results of what we are doing, and why we are doing it. When I read today's Gospel, however, I also feel sad. I cannot help but reflect on how unintentionally prophetic Mark was being in linking the prediction of Jesus' passion with the status of a child.

The safeguards now needed in response to the criminal and scandalous behaviour of a very few leaders in the Church, means that many bishops, priests, religious and teachers can no longer follow Jesus' example and take children in our arms. I fully understand why this is the case, but the fact that we have to be so careful about the care of our children and have strict

protocols and legislation that covers such behaviour toward children is a necessary and, nonetheless, tragic moment. It's also a moment for us to remember the passion of those who have had to endure the trauma of destructive behaviour. As the Jews say of the Holocaust, 'to forget is to commit the same mistake again'. At its most basic level the latter part of today's Gospel reveals what we would expect of Jesus – he likes children and they like him.

It's amazing how a couple of pieces of information can sometimes change the way a scriptural story is read, and its importance for our lives today. We know from other documents of the same period as the New Testament that children in first century Palestine had no rights.

Anger

ne outcome of the Serena Williams outburst is that a journalist in the UK has announced that women need to get better at rage. She called the outburst a triumph and a reminder of why women need to get better at rage. "Wasn't Williams magnificent? I would give anything to be able to express my own long-repressed rages so openly. That kind of rage can't be expressed on social media - where every woman who loses it gets buried - and it can't be expressed at home, where as wives and mothers we are supposed to be Zen Buddhas calming everyone else down. But oh, the power of female rage when unharnessed!"

God help all of us if women allow themselves the self-indulgent permission that far too many men allow themselves. That's why 88% of all homicides are committed by men and 96% of prosecutions for domestic violence are men. The first step to violence begins with the habit of not self-restraining animal rage. Male anger is a toxic poison in our society. It may be unfair and it may be unequal but we do rely on the role of women to provide the ballast in our society to stop us all degenerating into barbarism. Low levels of self-control are associated with eventual criminal activity. Fortunately the majority of men have learned to exercise self-restraint.

But anger is largely a male thing. Males do engage in more physical and verbal aggression. While females engage in milder forms of aggression such as rumour spreading or gossiping. So why do so many of our politicians use anger and rumour mongering as strategies to achieve their aims? When research shows that only a small percentage of males are perpetrators of extreme verbal aggression, why do some politicians pander to that section of lowest common denominator males with their own clever use of verbal aggression?

The strategic use of anger is dangerous. It's not very clever. You end up with a Donald Trump leading the country. Or worse, you end up like the Middle East. Go and see the movie The Insult (now showing in selected cinemas). Set in Lebanon, an incident involving a few angry words between a Christian and a Palestinian refugee is hijacked by politicians and the media to feed the grievances that eat away at the any attempt to achieve social cohesion. The inevitable result is violence feeding the endless cycle of hatred and revenge.

Our new Prime Minister last week pledged not to 'pit one Australian against another'. He undertook to 'work for the unity of all Australians'. He might usefully begin with the bear pit of parliament. He could start by requiring his Party's politicians to shout less and refrain from strategically feeding the anger of those addicted to the messages of shock jocks. The cynical use by politicians of social media to amplify the echo chamber of grievances and grudges that inevitably exist between different groups in our society undermines National unity. We have just discarded a Prime Minister; discarded by a minority in his own party driven by little more than unresolved venom. It has resulted in chaos for the Party and for stable government. That is what *The Insult* points to.

Words matter. Angry words wound. Angry words amplify divisions. "Today, we are burdened by politicians who have decided that honesty requires that they show how deeply they detest each other, and a culture has emerged where groups feel free to display their contempt for any with whom they disagree. Our opponents have become our enemies, and our enemies have become monsters. This has become true for all political factions, and all political factions believe it is true only for their opponents. The idea that it is proper to hide and suppress our malice because not doing so is bad manners has been lost on all levels. With this has been lost the idea that it is possible to disagree on important matters, yet respect and even honour your opponent." (George Friedman)

No faction is willing to be the first to break the cycle. "We're not going to change until they do." Our politicians provide a corrupting model for us all. It is an unrelenting descent into discord.

Put immature behaviour behind you and pursue righteousness. Have nothing to do with foolish, ignorant controversies; you know that they breed quarrels. And the Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, correcting his opponents with reasonableness. God may perhaps grant them knowledge of the truth, and they may come to their senses and escape from the snare of the devil. Timothy 2:22-26.

He who controls his words has knowledge, and he who has a cool head has understanding. Even a fool who keeps silent is considered wise; when he keeps his mouth shut, he is deemed intelligent. Proverbs 17:27-28.

And the hardest of the lot:

You have heard that it said: 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, offer no resistance to one who is evil. When someone strikes you on [your] right cheek, turn the other one to him as well.

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They were possessions of their fathers, and they could be bought and sold, exploited and even killed without any recourse to the religious or civil law.

One way in which a child was publicly claimed in this society was that only their immediate family could touch them. The story, then, of Jesus embracing the child in public was in itself a social challenge to accepted customs. But it's much more than that. In taking the children in his arms, Jesus declares that they are possessions of no one, but they belong to us all as gifts. In the family of God, children are accorded the dignity and respect we would give to God.

Today's Gospel tells us that those who deserve our attention and esteem are the ones who are the least, the most at risk or those who put their talents and gifts at their service by making the world a better place for them. Just as he did in the market place of Galilee when he took the children in his arms, Jesus has a habit of turning our world's values upside down.
