uring World War II, Mary was one of hundreds of Australian women who fell in love with an American soldier. She married her Episcopalian Army Major at the side altar in a Catholic Church in 1945. He was dashing and handsome and by the time it came for him to return to Philadelphia in 1946, they were expecting their first child.

Upon arrival at her new home Mary found that her brave solider was not as fearless as she thought. He was completely dominated by his aristocratic, wealthy mother who made it clear from the beginning that she opposed the marriage. Mary's life in the family home was a nightmare. The tensions boiled over when Brendan was born. Regardless of the promises his father had made in Australia to have their children baptised Catholics, the solider waged no war against his mother who declared that if any grandchild of hers was baptised a 'papist' she would disinherit the three of them. The Major buckled under the maternal pressure and demanded that Brendan be baptised an

Episcopalian. Mary was devastated. She gathered her few possessions together, had her son baptised a Catholic and fled home.

In 1950, by now a divorcee, she met Maurice, a wonderful man who wanted to marry her and be a father to Brendan. When they went to see the local parish priest, he told them they could not be married in the Church and if they contracted a civil marriage they ran the risk of going to hell for eternity. They were tough days. Catholicism was one of the reasons Mary left the USA. In turn, the very Church she defended shut her out.

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks directly about marriage and divorce. In Jesus' day only a few women had rights before the law. These were wealthy women from the priestly families. They could divorce their husbands. The vast majority of women, however, were seen as possessions of their father, husband or son. A husband could draw up a divorce writ for any reason he wished and so force his wife out of their home into destitution or humiliate her by sending her back to her own family. No wonder

Jesus lays down the law so strongly about fidelity and commitment. His new interpretation of the Law of Moses defended women's rights to dignity and security.

Every Catholic parish today has parishioners who are divorced and remarried; no doubt some are here at this Mass. In the face of the negative messages you hear, I want you to know how much we admire your often heroic faith, how much God loves you and how grateful we are that you hang in here with us. The problem for the Church is that, on the one hand, we want to keep affirming the permanence of married love, and yet, on the other hand, we have an increasing number of Catholics who are divorcing. We are caught between the fine ideal Jesus teaches and the frail human condition we all carry in different ways. We have not got the balance right yet.

The Church's remedy to marriage breakdown is an annulment. An annulment is not a Catholic divorce. A civil divorce says the parties that were married are not now.

Being poor and being made to jump through useless hoops

t just seems like simple common sense to expect the unemployed to do something to help themselves if they want government support. One of our greatest writers (George Orwell) experienced poverty and wrote about it in *Down and Out in Paris and London*. He said being poor is extremely complicated. Mostly it's not terrible. It's merely squalid and boring. Orwell remembers spending entire days lying in bed because there was nothing worth getting up for. "The crux of poverty is that it annihilates the future." All that remains is surviving in the here and now. He was also outraged that "people take it for granted that they have a right to preach at you and pray over you as soon as your income falls below a certain level."

In recent decades the Western World's welfare states have been using Big Brother tactics to ensure taxpayers money is not being wasted on bludgers. These states have embraced *job getting* schemes for the unemployed: job application workshops; picking up rubbish and cleaning up the environment stints; psychological counselling and computer training to access job advertisements. It doesn't seem to matter that there are ten applicants for every job.

The problem of the unemployed is that they haven't developed their employment skills or simply haven't given it their best shot. Ignore the fact that there are not enough jobs to go round. It is the fault of the unemployed that they haven't the drive or the skills to do productive work; not compared to the drive and skills of many advisors in the Finance Industry. The unemployed waste public money through their laziness and inadequacies. The Finance Industry squanders (and sometimes embezzles) private savings through their incompetence or greed. But at least they are not a burden on the public purse. Not, that is, until governments have to step in to prevent the collapse of individual financial institutions or (during the Global Financial Crisis) the entire financial system. Then it costs trillions. Much more than unemployment benefits.

Pope Francis has written: "Today it is said that many things cannot be done because there is no money. Yet "the money for weapons can be found, the money to make war, money for unscrupulous financial transactions." At the same time, he said, there seems to be no money "to create jobs, to invest in learning, in people's talents, to plan new welfare programs or to safeguard the environment."

A big question is: How to invest in and improve people's talents?

One of the most startling things about the industry that has grown up around providing job training is that often it doesn't work. Some return-to-work programs even prolong unemployment. And the caseworkers appointed to help dole claimants find a job often cost more than the unemployment benefits. And when you add the costs of the bureaucracy (i.e. the surveillance system) making sure people are not cheating the system, it's a huge drain on government finances.

Imagine this: A welfare mother with two kids has her benefits cut because she hasn't sufficiently developed her job skills. (That might be because the course she was doing was run by shysters who were scamming for lucrative government subsidies while providing crap training). The government saves a couple of thousand dollars. But the hidden costs of children who will consequently grow up poor, eat poor food, do poorly at school and be more likely to have a run-in with the law, are many times greater.

In fact the conservative criticism of the nanny state hits the nail on the head. The current tangle of red tape keeps people trapped in poverty. It actually produces dependence. The rest of us hold down a job by demonstrating our strengths. Social services require claimants to demonstrate over and over again their shortcomings: illness, depression and uselessness for employment. What must that do to you psychologically over time?

Pope Francis admits he doesn't have the answer. He asks all Christians to look for a solution. "The real problem isn't money, but people. We cannot ask money to do what only people can do or create. Money alone will not create development; to promote development we need people who have the courage to take the initiative.....Taking the initiative means overcoming excessive dependence on aid. We need to find a different way of resolving these problems."

Pope Francis spoke about the father of a young man with Down syndrome who joined with other parents and people with Down syndrome to form a cooperative, and then found a for-profit company willing to sell what the cooperative made. "The dad," Francis said, "needed the support offered by the state and by private organizations, but he was not content until he found a way to help his son make a sustainable living. If the father had not taken the initiative he would have been stuck asking the state for everything. When Christians look for ways to create new jobs, new ways of organizing a labour force and new ideas for employee participation schemes they should put an important Gospel value into the mix: love." There's the problem. What's the solution?

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An annulment says that there were factors, often unknown to the couple on the day, which meant that there was never a full and true Christian marriage in the first place. The sacrament is therefore null and void.

Some Catholics, and certainly people who are not Catholic, cannot face up to the long, complex and legal process involved in an annulment. It can be a traumatic experience. Others argue that the Church might step away from the more recent legal

approach to dealing with marriage and, like the Orthodox Churches, use the Sacrament of Penance to nullify the Sacrament of Marriage. Whatever of the process, Christian teaching on this issue must always be metered with compassion.

From 1951 until 1993 Mary and her second husband did not receive the Sacraments. At my encouragement, she instigated annulment proceedings in 1990. In 1993 they received communion for the first time in 42 years. God had never moved away from them, embracing

them in his arms, laying his hands on them every day and blessing them.

At that Nuptial Mass in 1994, Maurice's best man was Brendan, born in Philadelphia in 1946. Maurice had legally adopted Brendan the day after he married I Mary. And as we all received communion, with tears streaming down our faces, we understood that it is to human, frail and open hearts that the Kingdom of God belongs.
